### THE ARTICLES IN THIS ISSUE

In the first article in the issue, **Victoria Lund** examines how the Danish Ministry of Climate, Energy and Utilities' annual reports on climate impacts discursively frame Danish climate policy and determine what can be prioritised and legitimised. The article shows how dominant discourses position climate change as a controllable challenge that can be reconciled with economic growth and technological progress.

**Frederikke Neumann**'s article focuses on gesture in the Danish political debate programme Debatten and sheds light on how participants' and the moderator's gestures influence turn-taking. She demonstrates how bodily actions are used strategically and function as a central mechanism in the allocation of speaking turns during the debate.

In the third and final article, **Josephine Lindquist** investigates how sleep deprivation affects vowel articulation. Over the course of a 24-hour experiment, she recorded her participants and conducted various cognitive tests. Lindquist finds that participants' vowel space decreases in proportion to the number of hours they have been awake, indicating that fatigue affects articulation.
