It looks like the students who had the idea to start a linguistics journal by and for students, hit on a demand. But don't for a second believe that *Language Works* is a private party! ## The contents of this issue

In the previous issue we could present a section of contributions from the 2015 Student Conference of Linguistics, *Sprogvidenskabelig Studenterkonference 2015*, (SSK2015). In this issue however, we have no themed section but exclusively single contributions

The two single contributions in this issue are on the one hand Cecilie Hjelm Hertz' investigation of use and interpretation of the dating app *Tinder* and on the other Sine Hjuler and Anna Kragkov Larsens article on orality in the study program of Danish at the University of Copenhagen.

Cecilie Hjelm Hertz poses questions about the users' decoding and use of each other's profiles on *Tinder*. By using participant observation of users while they use *Tinder*, Hertz uncovers norms for use and norms for the construction of an online profile or an online identity. The analysis is centered on the medium's inherent multimodality and the relationship between the different modi and on the users' ability to construct coherent and authentic identities through the use of multimodal resources.

Sine Hjuler og Anna Kragkov Larsen's investigation uncovers experiences with, rules for, and attitudes towards instructions in orality at the study program of Danish at the University of Copenhagen. The program is a classic philological program combining studies in language, literature and to a lesser extent media. In order to draw a complete and complex picture of the issue, the authors include both text analysis of rules and regulations, surveys among students and teachers, and an interview with a leader at the program. Hjuler and Kragkov Larsen's overarching argument is that there is a lack of clarity in the understanding of the concept *orality*, and that rules and norms for the program therefore become obscure.

## Sharing is caring
