

BRAYES OF RUSSIAN OFFICERS KILLED IN BUDAPEST FIGHTING LIE NEARLY BARE IN CEMETERY, MOUNDS TO REAR MARK MASS GRAVES OF SOVIET ENLISTED MEN

OVER SILENT GRAVES A LOUD, FREE SONG

As the bitter struggle for Hungary continued, the nation's economy stood nearly at a standstill and its cemeteries received both Russian and rebel dead. Neither side showed any sign of backing down. Workers continued to stage sporadic strikes. Government police tried to

stop them by arresting union leaders and there was still shooting in the streets. The government offered one small favor. It promised a two-day Christmas holiday with pay for all workers—the first time in years the Communist regime has even suggested that Christmas exists.
